1. SAUTE Annual General Meeting 2025

Bern, 7 June, 10:30-12:00

The agenda is approved unanimously.

1. Minutes of the General Assembly, 26 April 2024

The minutes are approved unanimously.

2. Treasurer's Report and Budget

Revenues:

118 members paid their membership dues. Revenues also included SAGW subsidies (CHF 4'600) for SPELL and ESSE subsidies (CHF 887)

Expenses:

Variable expenses include the travel and resources awards (6 awards for a total of CHF 2'953.20).

Expenses exceeded revenues by 1'259.14, which is within the usual range of fluctuation.

Balance 31.12.2023: CHF 35'811.33; balance 31.12.2: 34'552.19

3. Auditor's Report

The auditors, David Correia Saavedra and Rahel Orgis, have examined the financial report and unconditionally recommend it for acceptance. The financial report is approved unanimously.

The treasurer's report and the auditors' report are approved unanimously.

4. New SAUTE Members

There are 29 new applications for membership.

5. Proposal for Change of Membership Conditions

- a) The SAUTE board proposes a permanently reduced membership fee for Emeriti/ae, notably 50% of the membership fee.

Emily Smith elaborates that PhD students are not obligated to pay their first year of membership and profit from other membership benefits (e.g. travel award). The measure is related to the SAGW's pressure on member societies to increase membership numbers.

The question is raised who counts as emeriti: only professors or any retired SAUTE members? It is suggested that retired members in general are included in this reduction. It is debated whether such a reduction is necessary at all and suggested that a reduction should apply, if at all, to non-permanently employed SAUTE members. Other suggestions include that the reduction may be optional. (Excess payment would flow, as is already the case now, to the travel and resources fund.) It is further pointed out that defining permanent and non-permanent employment is often difficult to determine (e.g. in the case of multiple employments).

Decision: A temporary measure will be implemented, which will be revisited with regard to its financial impact.

- Membership is free for the first year, and from 2026 onwards, for all PhD students. The measure will be revisited in two years.
- Retired SAUTE members (professorial and non-professorial) will enjoy a 50%-reduced membership fee, with the option of paying the full membership fee.

The proposal is approved, with one abstention.

- b) The SAUTE suggests a revision of article 4 of the statutes: ‘Die Mitgliedschaft steht Personen offen, die an einer Hochschule unterrichten und / oder wissenschaftlich tätig sind. Über Beitrittsgesuche entscheidet die Generalversammlung.’

The SAUTE board wants to (a) suggest some latitude regarding institutional affiliation and (b) make explicit a requirement for a professional link to Switzerland.

The following formulation is suggested as a basis for discussion:

Die Mitgliedschaft steht Personen offen, die an einer Hochschule (*Universität, eidgenössische technische Fachhochschule, pädagogische Hochschule, Fachhochschule*) im Bereich Anglistik oder verwandten Fächern unterrichten oder im weiteren Sinne wissenschaftlich tätig sind und eine berufliche Verbindung zu einer schweizerischen Hochschule aufweisen oder in der Vergangenheit über einen längeren Zeitraum aufgewiesen haben. Über Beitrittsgesuche entscheidet die Generalversammlung.

The idea underlying this proposed amendment is to give a clearer indication of what is expected, while maintaining some leeway for untypical cases that might still be subject to the discretion of the board/AGM.

It is pointed out that ESSE membership requires membership in a national society, and in the absence of national societies, some scholars have no possibility of becoming ESSE members. Crispin Thurlow responds that this is a problem that ESSE should address directly rather than devolving such decisions to national societies. It is suggested that the SAUTE board could propose this to ESSE, and in case ESSE refuses to accept members who are not members of a national society, SAUTE could reconsider accepting non-Swiss members.

Finally, a slight change is proposed (in bold in the following), and the amendment is approved in the following form, with one abstention:

6. SPELL

Ina Habermann, general editor of SPELL, reports on current technical negotiations with SAGW (e.g. concerning ORCID identification for individual contributors, visibility), which are on course and progressing smoothly.

12. Curricular Matters

Coming out of last year's AI workshop, there is persistent interest in investigating the challenges and possibilities offered by AI where the teaching of our disciplines is concerned. The topic will be pursued in the future. Initiatives related to online resources had to be put on hold due to the pending redesign of the SAGW and SAUTE websites.

13. Webmaster's Report

The webmaster reports on the impending transition to a new website:

The SAUTE website is part of the larger digital infrastructure of the SAGW, and some recent changes undertaken by the SAGW will therefore also affect the SAUTE website. More specifically, the SAGW is changing its CMS (content management system) and switching from Typo3 to Payload – the editor of which will hopefully be easier to use. This means that SAUTE, too, will get a new website and that there will, as in the past, be no expenses associated with it. However, as with the current arrangement, there will be limited flexibility with regard to the website design, which will be more or less identical across all SAGW member society websites. Finally, IT service will from now on be handled externally by two private agencies, Vorhall and Maji UX Studio.

The SAGW website will go live at the end of 2025/beginning of 2026 – and the member society websites will follow suit in the following half year, between January and June 2026, when the old websites will be deactivated as well. Training and workshops for the transition will be offered by the SAGW, so this will hopefully be a smooth transition.

14. SAUTE Database and Mailing List

Emily Smith reports on changes to the SAUTE database:

The board has decided to store membership data from now on in a password protected excel file. Excel features all functionalities that the board requires for its work with SAUTE membership data. Unlike previously, access and writing rights can be granted individually, and institutional dependance on university-specific servers and software is sidestepped.

The database will be hosted on SwitchDrive. SwitchDrive is safe and accessible to most institutions of higher education in Switzerland. This means that personal transitions will be much smoother, as granting full writing access to new board members entrusted with the database will no longer require institution-bound IT support. Currently, board members do not have full writing rights, which would only be possible if SAUTE used FileMaker, the software in question, in the prohibitively costly stand-alone version, and which makes a number of essential tasks, such as adding new columns for new years, needlessly difficult.

A transfer to a new data storage and management solution would not be urgent at the moment, but it would have to happen at some point. While UZH is still happy to host the database for the time being, they will not update to a newer version of FileMaker due to prohibitive costs, so support for FM18 (currently in use) will cease eventually.

In the future, the board will collect fewer sensitive data (home addresses, private phone numbers), which are simply no longer necessary and easily out of date, given the mobile nature of academic professions.

Emily Smith further reports on problems with the mailing list:

The mailing list is currently based in Zurich, but especially with current Outlook filters, many emails no longer find their targets. Problems started c. two years ago, when Swiss universities implemented increasingly strict security measures.

Emily Smith urges SAUTE members to consider the following points when distributing messages via the mailing list:

- 1) The distinction between internal and external sender also applies when emails are forwarded. Instead of forwarding emails from external senders, members are advised copy-paste the text of external members.
- 2) Attachments increase the risk of an email being flagged by Outlook filters. When possible, links to pertinent information and/or documents are preferable (e.g. to Dropbox or SwitchDrive).
- 3) Members are once again encouraged to add the mailing list to their safe sender list in Outlook.

If problems with the mailing list persist, an RSS-feed might be an alternative, and we should look into these with the future website developments too.

15. ESSU (English Studies at Swiss Universities)

The ESSU booklet is almost ready for publication, with the exception of the minutes of the AGM 2025. Emily Smith will send out a draft of the mailing list to members for proofing and final additions. Publications from 2025 will only be included in the bulletin for the following year.

16. Next Biennial Conference: Lausanne in 2027

17. News from the SAGW (Swiss Academy of Humanities and Social Sciences)

Summary of key points from the 2025 SAGW Annual Meeting, 23-24 May 2025, University of Bern (report by SAGW delegate Julia Straub)

Presidents' Meeting on May 23:

The SAGW has undergone an internal reorganization. Both the Presidency and executive management are now shared mandates. Some first changes are taking effect: renaming of the “Nachwuchspreis”; change of the logo; new website; and a shortening of next year’s annual meeting, among other initiatives. By and large, the SAGW is keen to promote knowledge transfer and communication with the public. They offer training courses to member societies and encourage activities in the field of science communication. This year’s workshops for the Presidents, too, were dedicated to making our voices heard, with a focus on membership recruitment, communication strategies, and networking.

Savoir public (<https://www.savoirpublic.ch>) is one example: a public-facing platform aimed at research communication with the broader population. Individuals can submit questions that will be forwarded to a pool of dedicated researcher from all sorts of disciplines. Answer will be provided within 3 working days; eventually published on the website. They are still looking to recruit more volunteers (self-nomination or recommendation). This initiative is targeting schools in particular, co-funded by the SAGW.

The Early Career Award was awarded to two historians and one political scientist. The shortlisted candidates come from sociology, history, and political science. Members of SAUTE are strongly encouraged to participate in future competitions.

Meeting of Sektion 3 on May 24

The greatest controversy emerged around the new logo of the SAGW – to be implemented soon also on our website – as it is in English.

Open Access (gold standard) is now a requirement for all societies. SAUTE has met this goal ahead of time thanks to the General Editors’ commitment.

Recto Verso series: The current theme until July 2025 is: “Freiheiten / Libertés,” followed by “Zukünfte”.

The SAGW welcomes suggestions for the following years. A call for contributions to “Zukünfte” will be published in autumn.

Delegates’ Assembly on May 24

Projekt Heimspiel («Science et Cité»): bringing science back home. Junior researchers present their research in their hometown. Ideas welcome!

18. European Society for the Study of English (ESSE)

1. Nominations have been submitted to the Executive Board for the next ESSE Secretary and ESSE Treasurer; these terms begin January 2026.
2. The next Board Meeting takes place in Valetta, Malta, 5 to 6 September 2025; as always, this is preceded by a two-day doctoral symposium (funding up to €500 is available).
3. The next ESSE Conference takes place in Santiago de Compostela, Spain, 31 August to 4 September 2026 – together with the usual board meeting and doctoral symposium.
4. At the time of the conference, book prizes of €1'500 are awarded by the board in four categories: language and linguistics; literature; cultural/area studies; and “Junior Scholars”. The deadline for submission will be 1 February 2026.
5. Bursaries of €1'800 are available for doctoral candidates and for post-PhD scholars needing financial support for research trips; the next application deadline is 01 February 2026.
6. In 2028, the ESSE Conference will be hosted by Manchester Metropolitan University, UK.

19. News from Doctoral Schools

CUSO Doctoral Programme

Simon Swift has taken over as president of the CUSO doctoral programme in English and reports that the programme remains strong, with 10 proposals received for 2026 from across the range of literary and linguistic study. The two doctoral workshops in Medieval and Earl Modern, and Modern and Contemporary Literature, each held fortnightly alternating at Geneva, continue to attract doctoral students from across Switzerland and to host interesting speakers. The Director would like to remind doctoral students from Basel and Zurich that they are really welcome to attend all CUSO workshops, but unfortunately CUSO won’t reimburse their travel. They can find out information and sign up for these events through the CUSO English program website english.cuso.ch.

DocNetCH

This spring, Nastacia Schmoll (Zurich) and Tammy Imboden (Basel) founded the Swiss Literary PhD Network (DocNetCH, for short), a network of PhD students of literary studies across Switzerland. The network’s inaugural event, “Actor-Network Theory and Literary Interpretation,” took place in April and was attended by around 20 PhD candidates from Basel, Bern, Geneva, Neuchâtel, and Zurich. The aims of the network include connecting PhD candidates of literary studies across philologies and disciplines from any university within Switzerland in both formal and informal settings. The network aims to foster professional relationships, scientific exchange and support for each others’ projects, particularly through its

biannual workshops, organised and led by its members. DocNetCH has a mailing list that any doctoral candidate can join, as well as a WhatsApp group to establish more informal contact between participants. To join the network, get in touch with Nastacia Schmoll (nastacia.schmoll@es.uzh.ch) or Tammy Imboden (tamaradima.imboden@unibas.ch). Information about the upcoming workshop in Autumn will be circulated in July.

Basel

Ina Habermann (UNIBAS) points out that the Hermann Paul School of Linguistics Basel-Freiburg offers full grants, and a literature-oriented doctoral school (including German, French, and Italian literary studies) provides seed money (one year, usually) to doctoral students.

On behalf of Heike Behrens, Ina Habermann also draws attention to the International Society for the Linguistics of English Summer school 2024 on the topic of “English(es) as a Moving Target – Exploring Online Data and Online Processing” (22-27 July, Freiburg i. Br.)

Fribourg

Kilian Schindler (UNIFR) points out that there is now, since the spring semester 2025, a new doctoral school (Graduate School ProMoRen) attached to the interdisciplinary Institute of Renaissance Studies in Fribourg, which includes 13 different disciplines from the faculties of humanities and theology, including English literature. This doctoral school organises at least one two-day event per year, where doctoral students present work to members of the institute and international guests, who act as respondents to individual papers. The first event of this kind was just held in spring 2025. A temporary or permanent integration of doctoral students in early modern studies who are not from Fribourg is envisaged as well.

20. News from Member Universities

University of Basel

Prof. Philipp Schweighauser (American Studies) received funding for a four-year research project from the Claudine und Hans-Heiner Zaeslin-Bustany Foundation. “Anglo Genres for Atlantic Futures: Contemporary Eco-Fictions, Campus Novels, and Science Fictions” brings together two PhD candidates (Isabel Jimenez, Letizia Ambrosetti) and a postdoc (tbd) to explore contemporary works in three popular literary genres that have emerged in the Anglophone world and deal with central social issues of today’s knowledge societies, including climate change, the role of universities in knowledge production, and artificial intelligence. Project start is October 1, 2025.

Via SwissBritNet (SNF Project Ina Habermann on Swiss-British cultural exchange and knowledge networks in the early modern period), Basel is supporting the establishment of République-des-lettres, a nationwide sustainable project platform developed by collaborators from hallerNet Bern and to be established under the umbrella of SAGW. The SAUTE board also expressed its support for this initiative. Goals: nationwide network, visibility, sustainability

University of Bern

- 5 of 6 professors will retire in the imminent future, so there will be major personal changes in the department.
- Gwynne Mapes has successfully defended her habilitation on “The Language Work of Speechwriters.”

University of Fribourg

Events:

- This summer, UniFr will for the first time host the triennial conference of the International Medieval Theatre Conference, with accompanying Theatre Festival featuring productions at various heritage venues around the city (18-22 July). Registration for the conference and attendance at any or all of the performances is free, thanks to generous grants from the SNSF, Agora, and the University of Fribourg. See SITM website for details of productions. <https://www.sitm.info/> There will be a CUSO doctoral school interwoven into the event, exploring 'Sensitive Subjects in Teaching and Research' in the medieval and early modern periods, and workshops on story-telling and performance techniques in the classroom.

Funding:

- Didier Maillat has obtained, together with Noah Bubenhofer from Zurich, SNSF Agora funding for a three year project on Linguistics for Upper Secondary Schools.

Staff Changes:

- Chiara Pessina was hired as doctoral student in Didier Maillat's Agora project.
- Thomas Austenfeld is retiring as professor of American literature this summer and will be replaced by Michael Boyden, formerly Radboud University of Nijmegen, who will start as full professor in August.
- Dr Sonya Yampolskaya has now joined the WOMARD team (Elisabeth Dutton's SNF project on “Women, Martyrdom, & Religious Drama in the Abrahamic Traditions, in medieval literature.”)

- Nino Töndury has joined the section of modern English literature as a doctoral assistant.
- Alan Lombardini has started as a doctoral assistant in linguistics.
- Damien Elsig has started as a PhD student in early modern literature.
- Bruna Paz Schmid has started as a PhD student in linguistics (after having obtained the faculty prize 2025 for her MA thesis).

Thesis Defence

- Stephanie Allen: “Workes of darkness”: Obscure poetics in Oxford University tragedy, 1547 – 1603, with the grade *summa cum laude*. The dissertation was awarded the Vigener Prize 2025 of the Faculté des sciences humaines et sociales.

Finally, the University of Fribourg also has sad news to share, namely, the passing of Prof em. Anthony Mortimer, on the 19 March of this year. He was professor of English literature at the University of Fribourg from 1978 to 2006. After his retirement, he embarked, as it were, on a second career as a translator, publishing no less than 14 volumes of verse, prose, and dramatic translation into English from French, Italian, and German, the last one of which – a volume of poetry by the Swiss writer Conrad Ferdinand Meyer – will appear later this year.

University of Geneva

Staff changes:

- Katherine Hallemeier, formerly of Oklahoma State University, has joined the department as MER.
- Simon Swift has become director of the CUSO programme in English.
- Holly Lavergne has been appointed as a doctoral assistant.
- Prof. Genoveva Puskas will retire in summer 2025, and has been replaced by Tabea Ishane (formerly a *chargée de cours*, now a *Professeure Associée*) through the now-defunct *Passerelle* programme. Prof. Ishane’s replacement is yet to be announced.

Funding:

- Devani Singh has obtained an SNSF Starting Grant for her project “Caroline Spurgeon in the 21st Century: Chaucer Allusions, Shakespeare’s Imagery, and the Digital Humanities”
- Simon Swift has obtained an DNSG Agora grant bringing refugees into an immersive experience of natural environments connected to Romantic Writing in England and Switzerland.
